Significant Changes and Forward Movement

At the beginning of 2016, co-chair Reverend William Patrick Edwards prepared to leave the diocese and answer a call to serve as the rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in Southampton, New York. In late February, Lindsey Ardrey was appointed to join Trevor-David Bryan as co-chair. Throughout the year, a strong initiative was made to take deliberate steps towards cultivating a group of commission members who were grounded in spiritual formation. With this task in mind, monthly meetings were established and churches around the diocese were invited to host. St. George's, St. Paul's, St. Patrick's, St. James, and St. Augustine's Episcopal Churches were all grateful contributors to celebrating the Eucharist and participating in thoughtful dialogue during monthly meetings. The commission also sought to expand its reach by developing a social media presence and acquiring marketing materials.

The commission also prioritized implementation of The National Church's *Seeing the Face of God in Each Other* training program by partnering with the Diocese of Atlanta's Commission for Dismantling Racism. Atlanta's commission, *The Beloved Community*, shared their story of transformation and helped to cultivate a new direction for Louisiana. In December 2015, Atlanta's chair, Dr. Catherine Meeks, facilitated the annual retreat and invited members to visit Atlanta for a training workshop. Commission members Reverend Dan Krutz, Lindsey Ardrey, Trevor-David Bryan,

and Patricia Corderman were welcomed guests in Atlanta and upon return to Louisiana began structuring a tailored *Seeing the Face of God in Each Other* training. The group looks forward to implementing the program in 2016.

- Mardi Gras Indian Queen Cherice Harrison-Nelson performed a one-woman play at St. George's Episcopal Church on April 19th, 2016.
- On Sunday July 10th, 2016 after the shooting of Alton Sterling in Baton Rouge, commission members and other motivated parishioners joined young people of the WAVE in a march to the State Capital Builiding.
- On October 23rd, 2016 a screening of *Traces of the Trade* and a discussion facilitated by creator and director Katrina Browne was held at St. George's Episcopal Church. On October 25th, Katrina Brown guided a workshop on movement and dance for racial healing facilitated by Katrina Browne.
