# A Message from Archdeacon Charlie

In this issue of The PeliDeacon, we look at St. Ephrem of Edessa, a fourth-century deacon, poet, and composer. I consider St. Ephrem my patron saint for two reasons. The first is that I was ordained a deacon on June 10, 1995, the calendar date on which we remember this holy man. The second is that I too am a deacon, poet and composer.

In my early days as a Christian, I had the sense that my "spiritual" life was comprised of going to church, time spent in prayer, and

time spent in ministry. And then there was my business life, my life as a writer, musician, my family life, my social life, etc. Everything seemed to be divided into these neat little boxes.

Over the years, as I've matured in my faith, those lines began to blur until now, I don't see the lines at all anymore. There is just one life I'm leading, and it's all dedicated to God. Prayer, worship and ministry are, of course, still an important part of that one life, but the rest of my life is not separate from my love and devotion to our LORD. There's no part of my life in which I'm not aware of and grateful for God's living Spirit. Whatever I'm doing—playing music, spending time with family, writing, praying, socializing—I dedicate it to God, trusting that he will honor my intention and my efforts with his grace and mercy.

When we are finished at St. Anna's Church, we then travel home. I look forward to seeing all of you there.





# Deacon Saints and Heroes

### Saint Ephrem of Edessa

### Deacon, poet, composer, defender of the faith



Recent book on Ephrem of Edessa

Born in 306 AD, Ephrem of Edessa (also known as Ephrem of Syria or Ephrem of Nisibis) was a prominent Christian theologian and writer, who is revered as one of the most notable hymnographers of Eastern Christianity. He was born in Nisibis, served as a deacon and later lived in Edessa, and is counted as a Holy and Venerable Father (i.e., a sainted Monk) in the Eastern Orthodox Church. He was declared a Doctor of the Church in the Roman Catholic Church in 1920. Ephrem is also credited as the founder of the School of Nisibis, which, in later centuries, was the center of learning of the Church of the East.

Ephrem countered the Gnostics' practice of spreading their message through popular songs by composing Christian songs and hymns of his own, with great effect. He is known to the Syrian church as "the harp of the Holy Spirit." He wrote a wide variety of hymns, poems, and sermons in verse, as well as prose exeges is. He is said to have accompanied his bishop, James of Nisibis, to the Council of Nicea in 325.

Ephrem's writings are an eloquent defence of the Nicene faith in the Deity of Jesus Christ. Ephrem eventually retired to a cave outside Edessa, where he lived in great simplicity and devoted himself to writing. He frequently went into the city to preach. During a famine in 372-3 he worked distributing food to the hungry, and organizing a sort of ambulance service for the sick. He worked long hours at this, and became exhausted and sick, and so died.

Of his writings there remain 72 hymns, commentaries on the Old and New Testaments, and numerous sermons.

### PRAYER (contemporary language)

Pour out upon us, O Lord, that same Spirit by which your deacon Ephrem declared the mysteries of faith in sacred song; that with gladdened hearts we too might proclaim the riches of your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

## **Emergency 101 for Deacons**

Emergency preparedness refers to actions which can and should be performed prior to an emergency, such as planning and coordination meetings, procedure writing, team training, emergency drills and exercises, and prepositioning of emergency equipment. Emergency response refers to actions taken in response to an actual, ongoing event.

Long-time ERD responder Deacon Elaine Clements explains these two categories "call for two different skill sets, two different kinds of people. It's important to consider ahead of time where your personality type and skills might be the best fit."



## A Prayer of St. Ephrem of Edessa

O Lord and Master of my life, do not give me the spirit of laziness, meddling, self-importance and idle talk. (prostration) Instead, grace me, Your servant, with the spirit of modesty, humility, patience, and love. (prostration) Indeed, my Lord and King, grant that I may see my own faults, and not condemn my brothers and sisters, for You are blessed unto ages of ages. Amen. (prostration) (Twelve deep bows, saying each time: O God, be gracious to me, a sinner.)
