

## The Origins of "Grace at the Green Light"

On a beautiful sunny spring day in 2014 I decided to attend a Noonday Eucharist at Christ Church Cathedral. As I drove up and parked on St. Charles Avenue, Dean David du Plantier was standing outside the cathedral (as usual) ready to greet guests as they arrived for the service.

I shook hands and exchanged greetings with David, and as I went into the chapel a thought entered my mind which went something like this; "David, I don't think we can simply stand outside of the church and expect people just to come in anymore". After the Eucharist I walked next door to the cathedral offices to attend a session with my EFM class which started at 1 pm.



This was my fourth and final year of EFM with a group of six cohorts led by a wonderful mentor, Bill Foreman, who had led EFM groups for years at the cathedral. I have since lost memory of what we were studying specifically during that session, but suffice it to say that it had something to do with formation for

mission within the church. At some point during the class, I was prompted to recall my thoughts as I had entered the church earlier.

Immediately after sharing that story one of my cohorts piped up and said, "You know Joey, I have been driving up and down St. Charles Ave. for years, encountering the homeless encampments along the way. I've stopped many times to help these folks with either money, blankets, food, etc. We need to do more, and I'm going to do something about it. I'm going to reach out and find a place and the people to offer food and other services for our unhoused neighbors in the city."

Sure enough, within weeks Chris Beary reached out to the community to begin plans for the soon to become Grace at the Green Light, a 501 (c) (3) organization offering the New Orleans unhoused population choices while providing for their basic needs (water, food, clothing and community) in a loving manner that embraces the human spirit.

Since Chris founded this outreach in Central City New Orleans in 2014, Grace at the Green Light has distributed 245k meals, 1m bottles of water, 2749 participants have been reunited with their families through the "Going Home" program, and 5775 articles of clothing have been distributed. I have had the privilege of serving on the board of Grace at the Green Light and standing alongside the unhoused community in New Orleans, working with the hundreds of volunteers who show up daily 7 days a week to be "One With" our unhoused neighbors.

It does not, in fact, matter to me if it was coincidence or insight or the source behind my consciousness to hear the whispers that told me to tell that story at EFM. All I know is that I'm glad as hell that I said it. I don't need there to be anything special about it, but as one who believes that mysteries like these swell the womb of every given moment, I've made to a point never to preclude it.

# Deacon Saints and Heroes

## **David Pendleton Oakerhater**

## A Deacon Warrior for Peace

David P. Oakerhater (born around 1850) was a warrior and leader of the Cheyenne Indians of Oklahoma, and led a corps of fighters against the United States government in a dispute over Indian land rights. In 1875 he and 27 other military leaders were taken prisoner by the U S Army and sent to a military post in Florida. There, thanks to the efforts of a concerned Army captain, they learned English, were encouraged to earn money by giving art and archery lessons to visitors, and encountered the Christian faith. David and three others were moved to become Christians and to go north to study for the ministry. David was baptized in Syracuse, New York, in 1878, and ordained to the diaconate in 1881. He returned to Oklahoma and there founded schools and missions, and continued to work among his people until his death on 31

August 1931. When he first returned to Oklahoma in 1881, he said:

You all know me. You remember when I led you out to war I

went First, and what I told you was true. Now I have been away to the East and I have learned about another captain, the Lord Jesus Christ, and he is my leader. He goes first, and all He tells me is true. I come back to my people to tell you to go with me now in this new road, a war that makes all for peace.



#### PRAYER (contemporary language)



Amen.
